THE UNGLAMOROUS CROSS

As we enter into our Lenten preparation for the great celebration of Easter it would be beneficial to examine our understanding of 'the Cross' in our spirituality. For us, as Catholic Christians, we must maintain a balanced tension between the Cross and the Resurrection of Our Lord Jesus Christ. We've heard the argument, ad nauseum, from our separated brethren that Jesus is no longer on the Cross. Yes, that is true, but the Crucifix is a polyvalent sign; that is, within the cross we find many meanings. Within it we find the cost of our salvation (the Gift of a Loving Father who surrenders what is most precious to Him - His Son). Within it is the key to understanding the saving 'daily cross' of the believer. Within it is a deeper truth, as well. As long as there is one member of the Body of Christ that is still suffering, we can say that the Lord – because He identifies Himself with the least of His brethren – is still suffering. Therefore the cross is a reminder to continue to work at building-up the community in its most neglected and poorer members.

If you believe that Jesus Christ is True God and True Man (and we do), then it stands to reason that the Cross, whether we like it or not, stands at the center of our created universe. If the God Man chose to redeem us through an instrument of shame, it stands to reason that we should spend some time reflecting upon this Mystery. By ‘Mystery’ I refer to the Church’s understanding of that word; that is, a central Truth about our salvation and, therefore, about ourselves. If we are to take scripture seriously, the call of Christ to His disciples ‘to take up our cross daily’ can only be deciphered when understood in the light of His own Glorious and Victorious Cross.

Just as there may be a tendency to ‘ignore’ or ‘not think’ about the Cross, there is also the tendency to ‘romanticize’ the Cross. Doing so robs it of the profound tragedy that is to be found in the Cross of Christ. We must not diminish the sign of contradiction by dulling its edge with piety that tends towards sentimentalism. The truth of the matter is that our cross, just as Our Lord’s Cross, is difficult to carry. At times in our weakness we may refuse ‘it’ – however we may see ‘it’ to be. Yet, in spite of our weakness, the Lord continues to offer His Holy Spirit as our Divine Assistant and gently encourages to take up our Cross which leads to the freedom of the Sons of God.

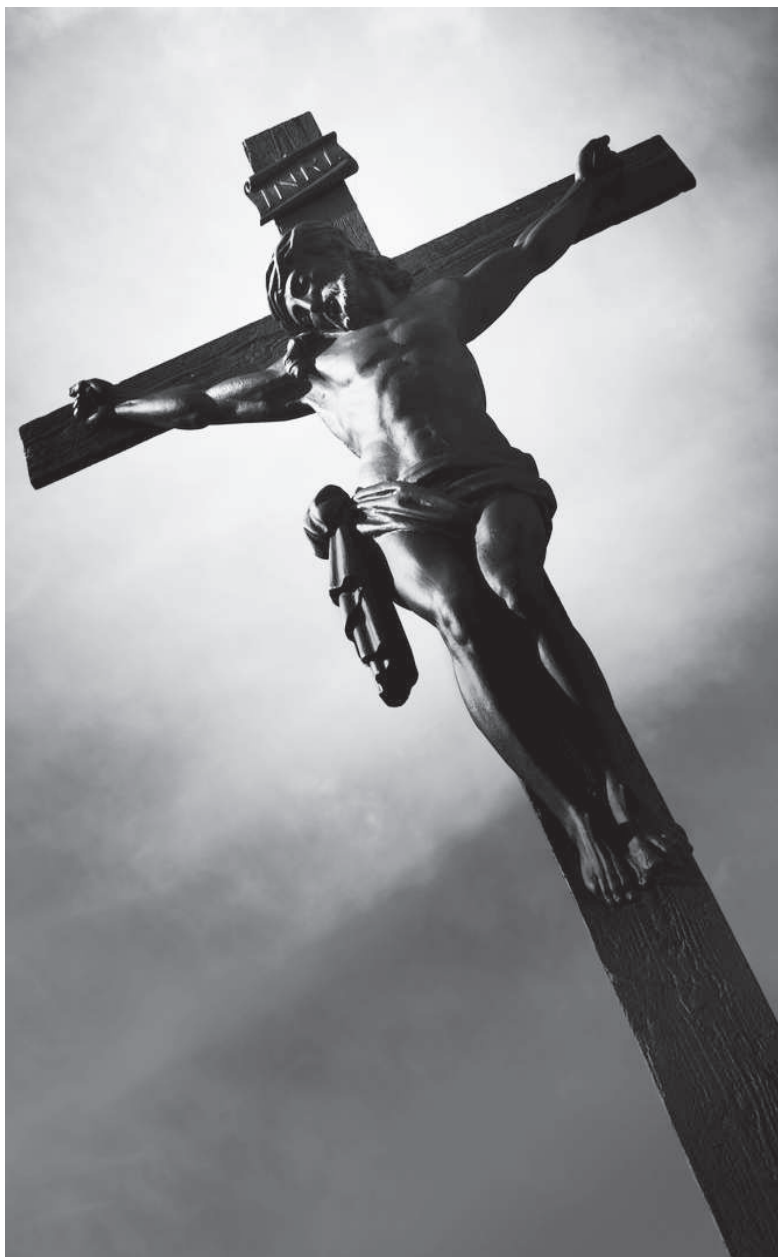

We at Mount Carmel Center have the responsibility of guiding souls into a deeper relationship with Jesus Christ. Our call is an 'ecclesial' call, a communal call, a call to form a 'family' of believers that continues to trust in the Apostolic truth that has been faithfully handed down to us.

As a mendicant (begging), religious order, who take a vow of poverty; we receive no direct financial support from any Diocese. We need your personal and financial support to continue in our mission. Near the end of last year donations were down over 35%. Thank you to those who responded to our appeal. While your outpouring of generosity has helped us to raise 20% in the last month, this is the first time in the last 6 years that we have ended the year lower than the previous year.

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You've Warmed Our Hearts

Dear Friends,

With our hand on our heart and our heart in our hand we would like to thank you for your kindest concern for our well-being. Recently some of you heard of our needs concerning our heating. Due to the unsure economic times, donations were down in 2011 by over 30% and (when it rains it pours) our 62 year-old furnace seems to be going the way of all flesh, it might get us through this winter but most definitely will not make it through another.

[The cost to run the gas furnace, depending on its use, can run between 600 to 800 dollars a month. I bought some flannel sheets for us and we have set the thermostat to 60 – of course we turn it up when we have guests. There is a leak in one of the water pipes that runs through the furnace, leaking water into the furnace itself causing some of the fire-bricks to crack. It is not repairable or worth replacing (50K) since our vision is to phase this out and install cost-efficient heating units – split-unit heating pumps with A/C – throughout the facility.]

Many of you have sent donations to meet our heating cost for this winter and your generosity has not only warmed our toes it has warmed our hearts. We are speechless and humbled by your kindness.

May the Glorious St. Joseph, Protector of our Order, reward your kindness toward us. We continue to offer our prayers for you at the altar during the Holy Sacrifice of the Eucharist.

For iPhone users:

Stations of Cross – This app from Ave Maria press is a nicely illustrated guide to the stations of the cross. It is available in English and Spanish.

Divine Office – This app is an audio and text version of the official Liturgy of the Hours. It wirelessly downloads several days of prayers at a time, without the need for iTunes synchronization or access to a computer.

For Android users:

iStations for Android – This is a simple illustrated app which takes you through each station with prayers and a meditation. There is an option for listening to an audio reading of each station as well.

Laudate – A very impressive all text app which has the complete Liturgy of the Hours, Stations of the Cross, Mass readings, the Rosary and more. Available in English, Spanish, Italian, and several other languages.
